THE GREATEST PRINTER?

On the beautiful stained glass windows of the Albright Library perhaps you have noticed one depicting a dolphin wrapped around an anchor. This was the logo of Aldus Manutius, arguably the greatest, and certainly one of the most important printers of all times.

He was born in south central Italy in 1449 and received an excellent education in the Greek and Latin classics, ironically only available as handwritten manuscripts in his youth. He eventually settled in Venice and in 1494 founded the Aldine Press which specialized in small, affordable editions of the classics, an innovation at the time. He was the first to standardize punctuation, introduced the semicolon, and created clear typefaces, including italics. Perhaps most important to posterity was his work in preserving and propagating ancient Greek literature.

Venice was home to a collection of Greek manuscripts which survived the sack of Constantinople and the burning of its library in 1453. He made it a major part of his life's work to get them standardized, into print and preserved and disseminated for posterity. In 1502 he founded the New Academy which was devoted to the study of ancient literature; its most famous member was the Dutch humanist Erasmus, some of whose work Manutius published.

Despite the immense success and importance of his press, he died in relative poverty. 2015 marks the 500th anniversary of his passing. The press was continued by his son and grandson, and today its original books are highly sort after by well to do collectors. Thanks to modern printing and public libraries all of us can enjoy the fruits of his labor.

Are you permanently homebound and not able to use the bookmobile? The "Books By Mail" program will provide you with books, CDs and DVDs. Materials will be mailed to you in a nylon bag along with return postage. Simply return the bag to your local mail carrier or any U.S. Post Office. Would you like to use a computer but don't want to invest in one? Never used a computer before but would like to learn? The Scranton Public Library has computers you can use and can teach you how to use them. For more information, call 570-348-3000, extension 3038.

Meet Jack Finnerty, Executive Director of the Scranton Public Library BY JILL CADDEN

How did you become involved with the library?

"Well, there's a story to be told. In October '62, on a Friday afternoon, I was in Guidance Class across the street, when the teacher announced that the library was looking to hire a student to work in the Reference Department re-filing magazines. The position would involve working two hours after school each day and all day on Saturday for the princely sum of 55 cents an hour. Three of us interviewed and I got the job.

One day shortly after I started, Mrs. Hopkins, Head of

Reference, asked to speak with me. She said: "Jack you misfiled a magazine. Now Jack, that's a mistake...and you only get one." Needless to say, I didn't make any more!

Wow, what a great job. I loved the building and its history – even more after exploring its nooks and crannies, as well as learning about John Albright and how the library came to be; I loved being around books and magazines; and I loved how the Library was there for anyone to use, free of charge. And I really loved having money that I actually earned.

In the summer I worked 40-45 hours a week as I continued to take on more responsibilities. Actually, working at the library paid for my education. I went to the University of Scranton and earned a degree in Secondary Education. After graduating, I was offered a teaching job so I had a tough decision to make — pursue a teaching career or stay at the Library. Ultimately I decided I would delay the teaching career until I had a few more years under my belt. And the Library said they would allow me to work full-time hours and they would work around my class schedule, if I pursued a library degree. Marywood College offered this program. I decided to go to Marywood. I'd get back to teaching one day... and here I am. "

It seems that a lot of work has been going on. Tell me about it.

"In the past few years the Library has experienced some exciting changes. The elevator was installed 3 years ago, the exterior has undergone a major facelift and now the landscaping for the garden and the installation of the flagpole are nearing completion. With the help of the Sewer Authority, we were able to reroute rain water that had been feeding into the sewer system. Our downspouts now feed rain barrels located beneath the lawn. And a big "Thank You" to the Friends of the Library for donating the flagpole and surrounding plantings! But there's always more to do. In 2016 we'll focus on the interior: the Library needs new carpeting, painting, new restrooms and an updated phone system. "

OK, so that's what's new with the building. What about current programs?

"Libraries can take you from the cradle to the grave." We offer special programs for

every demographic: toddlers, teens, adults and seniors. We offer Ma Goose Lap Rap for ages 0-23 months; Pre-K Story Time, and Tales for Tots, for our toddlers; LEGO Robotics and Minecraft Mania for ages 8-18, the Young Adult Club, and Drop-by-Crafts for all ages. Our Computer Lab offers classes in Microsoft software, as well as classes for people who have never used a computer before. We offer instruction on desktops, laptops, ipads, kindles, etc. All free of course. We provide access to some great databases such as Ancestry.com, Morningstar investment services, POWER Library, MANGO Languages, Learn A Test, and many more. Students in all grades can login to Tutor.com for homework help in any subject. These are just some of our online offerings. And patrons who don't have a personal computer can use one of our public computers here at the Albright."

Does this mean the book is dead?

"Not at all. We are still very much in the print business. We add thousands of new books every year. Not to mention cd's, dvd's, blu rays, recorded books and magazines. Whether you prefer digital materials or actual "I want to hold it in my hand" materials – we've got them.

And of course, the patron is not limited to what we have here at the Albright. The Lackawanna County Library System which includes 9 libraries plus the bookmobile is available to everyone. But library connectivity and resource sharing goes way beyond Lackawanna County. The LCLS library card is recognized at more than 600 libraries throughout the Commonwealth. If you want a book not owned by your local library, you can request that title from any other library that does have it. When it arrives at your local library, you will be notified either by phone or email that it is available for you to borrow. You can also use your Library Card at the University of Scranton, Marywood University, and the Library Express located in the Steamtown Mall. Truly, your library card is a very powerful tool."

How important is the Friends of Scranton Public Library in helping the Library serve the public?

"We would not be the library we are today were it not for the support provided by our *Friends*. In fact we might not even exist. Now that may sound wildly exaggerated but let me explain. In the early 1980's the Library was in danger of losing funding provided by the City and County. The Library took its case to the voters by way of a referendum placed on the ballot in November 1982. Had we lost (and thankfully we did not) the Library, if it existed at all would be but a shadow of itself. During the months leading up to that fateful day, it was the Friends of the Library who came forward and provided all the necessary funds to make the case for a "YES" vote to thousands of Lackawanna County residents. I have no doubt that this crucial support by the Friends, made all the difference. Simply put, the services we offer today, possibly even the Library itself, would not exist but for the Friends who were there when we needed them most. "

What are your concerns for the future?

"The Library opened its doors to the public on June 1, 1893 and on June 1, 2018 the library will celebrate 125 years of enhancing the lives of individuals in our community by offering free access to materials and programs designed to meet informational, recreational and educational needs. And while the mission of the Library remains essentially unchanged, the world in which we struggle to accomplish the mission changes both rapidly and dramatically. In order to remain relevant, we need to be flexible, responsive and visionary. We must continue to demonstrate that we can deliver essential services – services of potential value to all citizens, in an effective manner. Providing public library service is, after all, a value proposition. And that is something that John J. Albright understood."
